President's Message

Greetings, Cape Cod Bird Club Members!

Welcome to the 56th year of Cape Cod Bird Club! September marks the end of summer, the beginning of our Club season, and the migration of birds... there's a lot going on!

It seems like every summer we see a few exceptionally rare birds and this summer was no exception. For the past few years, we've been seeing **Swallow-tailed Kites**, but this summer we were treated to sightings of juveniles being fed, which confirms for the very first time that they are successfully nesting in Massachusetts! Some other novel visitors this summer included a Crested Caracara which visited us in mid-July on the outer Cape, a White-faced Ibis in Chatham in late May (only the 2nd time ever on the Cape), and a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher in Falmouth in May. All these rarities are normally found in the western or southern US, and were possibly blown off course during migration. But somehow, they found Cape Cod as a place to rest up and re-charge, just as many of us do!

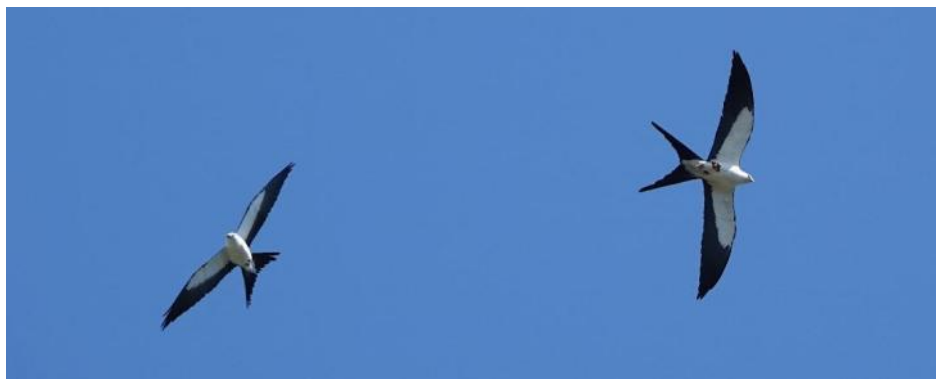

This 56th season will bring many engaging Programs along with a wide variety of Walks and other events. Thanks to our Programs Director, Gloria Smith, for working tirelessly to enlist speakers to deliver talks on enlightening topics each month. Another "tireless" worker is our Walks Director, Mary Jo Foti, who lined up over 60 walks for us last year, and ensures that we may "bird" the wide range of habitats Cape Cod has to offer, ably led by her enthusiastic team of Walk Leaders. We will also continue to fund conservation efforts in the Americas that promote awareness of birds and their intricate relationships in our natural world. This effort is led by our Conservation & Education Director, Peter Bono, our longest-serving Director! Monday, October 12, 2026 — David & Tammy McQuade "Chasing the North America Big Year Record"



If you have ever wondered how someone could possibly see the most birds in North America in one year (while holding a job!), then we have a story for you.

David and Tammy are high school sweethearts who each developed a love for birds and the outdoors as children. In 2012, their life changed forever when they saw the movie: "The Big Year." The idea of counting birds had an incredible appeal to them. The challenge of a year-long scavenger hunt really resonated with them.

They started with a Big Weekend around Lee County, Florida. It didn't take long for it to grow rapidly to County Big Years, then Florida Big Years. Once they realized they could coordinate their work with birding, that changed everything. They expanded to Lower 48 Big Years, ABA and US Big Years, and more recently North America and AOU Big Years. They have been fortunate to finish #1 multiple times in each of these categories. They are also the only birders to see over 700 birds in the US seven years in a row!

While they are proud of their accomplishments doing Big Years, they are even prouder of their contributions to research in understanding bird diversity in the Gulf of Mexico. When they are not traveling or working, they love to venture out on long-range pelagic trips in the Gulf of Mexico on their boat, the McLagic.

David is a former Board of Directors member for the ABA, with Tammy having served on several ABA committees. They are the current administrators for the SW Florida Bird Alert Facebook Group and are annual guides for the Cape Coral Burrowing Owl Festival.

October

High Head – N. Truro **Thursday, October 1 – 8am**

Meet at High Head Bike Trail parking lot. Bear left when you reach Cliff Rd to stay on High Head Rd, a dirt pathway that leads to parking for the bike trail. We'll be looking and listening for rails, bobwhites and American Bittern skulking through the marsh as well as searching overhead for raptors and scanning the thickets for passerines. Walk begins on the paved bike trail but may also include hard pack dirt trails of mixed elevation. Leader: MJ Foti

First Encounter Beach – Eastham **Friday, October 2 – 8am**

From Rt. 6, follow Samoset Rd. to the farthest parking area where we'll walk along the marsh trail bordered by the Herring River to observe shorebirds, herons, egrets, gulls and terns gathering in numbers to forage on the outgoing tide. We'll also encounter other species including a variety of passerines and raptors. *Beach sandals/ waterproof footwear recommended.* (low tide 10:22am)

Black Beach, Falmouth **Sunday, October 4 – 8am**

Parking is at Chapoquoit Beach. Take Route 28S; exit at Thomas B Landers Road; turn right at end of exit; then at stop sign turn left onto to 28A (south). Finally turn right onto Chapoquoit Road and follow it to Chapoquoit Beach parking lot (will be on

your left.) Join us as we seek out migrating shorebirds, terns, gulls, passerines and perhaps some early movement of sea ducks. It's about a 2-mile round trip, with scenic views of Buzzard's Bay and the Great Sippiwissett Marsh. We will walk out on Surf Drive to Black Beach. The return trip to the beach parking lot will be along the bike trail. For those who want to, we can then drive 5 minutes to W Falmouth Harbor (it's on the way back to 28A) where wigeons, gadwalls, and mergansers often hang out. Leader: Val

Crane Wildlife Management Area - **East Falmouth Sunday, October 11– 8am**

Meet at the parking lot of Otis Model Aero Club Flying Field. As you drive north on Nathan Ellis Highway, the entrance to Crane will be on your right next to Allietta Softball Field. You can count on productive raptor activity while this unique grassland habitat is also host to a rich variety of species, including Eastern Meadowlark, Grasshopper Sparrow, American Kestrel and possibly Blue Grosbeak. Hard pack trails can give way to more rock-strewn narrow paths - between 1.5 and 3 miles of walking.

Sandy Neck, West Barnstable **Saturday, October 24 – 7am**

Please note earlier start time! Take Sandy Neck Rd directly off Rt.6A and drive directly down to the main lot. We're hoping to have a big migration day of scoters and other seaducks traveling south. We should see at least some birds on the move, and depending on wind and weather, there could be a large flight of birds. We'll start by scoping from the beach near the parking lot. As the morning progresses, we'll venture farther out onto the beach and head back along the marsh trail. Expect at least 2-3 miles of walking in soft sand and dirt

trails. *Waterproof footwear/sturdy hiking boots recommended. (Co-sponsored with South Shore Bird Club)*

Robert F. Smith Cold Brook Preserve – Harwich Sunday, October 25 – 8am

From Rt. 39 in Harwich, take Bank Street to #203 - the Harbormaster's Workshop. Cold Brook Preserve underwent a major ecological restoration project completed in fall 2024 with newly restored and *easily navigable* trails throughout 66 acres of wetland and surrounding woodland. The intricate pond and trail system provides ideal habitat for a variety of passerines, hawks and waterfowl, in addition to otters and other mammals.

November

Harwich-Brewster Community Gardens Sunday, November 1 – 8am

Please note: Daylight Savings Time! Meet at the Harwich Community Gardens on Sisson Road just north of the Star Market on Route 28. This has traditionally been a nice spot for fall migration with some unlikely surprises in past years including Ash-throated Flycatcher and Grasshopper Sparrow. If time permits, we can head directly north to Brewster Community Gardens just opposite the Eddy Bay Trail. This requires little walking on hard pack dirt and is *easily navigable*.

Scusset Beach State Reservation – Sagamore Tuesday, November 3 – 8am

Take Scusset Beach Road to the main entrance. Parking is .25 miles beyond the entrance kiosk at the fishing pier. We'll spend the morning exploring the thickets on the wooded trails for fall migrants, walking the bike path along the canal where wintering waterfowl should just be coming in and exploring the campground area.

We'll finish up at the beach and scope the jetty at the mouth of the canal. Expect two miles of walking on mixed terrain – dirt trails, paved bike trail and beach. *(Co-sponsored with Brookline Bird Club)*

Fort Hill and Hemenway Landing – Eastham Tuesday, November 10 – 8am

From Route 6E, turn on Governor Prence Rd. and park in the first lot on the left just past Captain Penniman House. We'll walk the loop trail towards Hemenway Landing where there should be some nice migrant activity. We can also scan the marsh for incoming shorebirds, herons, egrets and hopefully a bittern or rail with the rising tide. Expect 2 miles of walking hard pack trails with mixed elevation and along the marsh at the water's edge. Waterproof hiking shoes/footwear recommended.

Doane Rock and Nauset Bay East Eastham Tuesday, November 17 – 8am

The walk begins in the parking area beyond Doane Rock which allows us two hours to explore this area of rich, mixed habitat. We'll begin on the wooded trails leading to Nauset Bay East, then stop on the wooden bridge spanning the marsh to observe shorebirds, coastal waterbirds, gulls and terns that gather in impressive numbers during fall migration. Expect to walk about 3 miles of paved and dirt trails.

Bells Neck Conservation Area – Harwich Sunday, November 22 – 8am

Meet at Bells Neck Road at the landing of the West Reservoir with parking in the nearby fenced-in lot. Take advantage of low tide conditions on the East Reservoir, enjoy the marsh overlook at the footbridge and scan the car bridge for raptors, waterfowl, and a possible bittern or rail. Expect about 2 miles of walking on varied terrain, sometimes narrow dirt trails with a slightly steep hill leading to the footbridge.

December

Harwich-Brewster Ponds Thursday, December 3 – 8am

From Route 124 (Pleasant Lake Ave.) turn on Headwaters Drive. The Cape Cod Rail Trail parking lot is about a half mile down on your left. A short walk on paved bike trail will bring you to our first stop, Hinckleys Pond. We'll then head to nearby Long Pond Beach in Harwich to view from our first of three vantage points. We'll finish up at Seymour Pond which includes a 10-minute walk each way along the bike trail. These mid-cape ponds host a variety of waterfowl including Greater and Lesser Scaup, Mergansers, Bufflehead and American Coot as well as the less common Barrow's Goldeneye.

Coast Guard Beach/Salt Pond Visitor Center – Eastham Wednesday, December 9 – 8am

Follow Route 6 to Eastham and turn right at Salt Pond Visitor Center onto Nauset Rd. This will become Doane Rd. which you'll follow to Ocean View Drive. Turn right and park in the lot by Nauset Coast Guard Station. You'll be walking south along the beach and return along the inside of the inlet.

Expect to walk about 2 miles in soft sand. The second leg of the trip is a stop at Salt Pond Visitor Center for further exploring. There are open bathrooms available year-round.

Corporation Beach - Scargo Lake, Dennis Saturday, December 19 – 8:00am

Meet at Corporation Beach off Route 6A in South Dennis where you can observe a variety of overwintering waterfowl, grebes, loons, alcids and the occasional Harlequin Duck directly from the parking area. Our observations will be primarily stationary and *very accessible* for all levels of mobility. Bring a scope if you have one.

West Barnstable Conservation Area - Barnstable Sunday, December 27 – 8am

From Exit 65 on Route 6, follow signs for 149S - a right turn after exiting the rotary. When you reach Marston Mills Rotary, head west on Race Lane (towards the airport hangar) for 1.2 miles. Turn right onto Crooked Cartway and follow the road until it opens onto a large, dirt parking area. This maze of old dirt roads traverses over 1,100 acres of pine-oak woodlands, interspersed with occasional brushy clearings and a broad power-line cut providing excellent birding throughout the year. Expect up to two miles of walking primarily wider and more *easily navigable* "cartway" trails.

BIS Student Bird Club — A Year in Review

The Bird Club, in its **7th Year strong**, at Barnstable Intermediate School has continued to thrive, with 8-12 students on average joining per year. **This is great news for birding and the birds!** Various topics throughout the year kept the students engaged and learning about feeder birds and local birds of Cape Cod, as well as learning how to ID birds using sight, sound, behavior, field guides, and birding apps like Merlin and Audubon. We also did “bird of the day” mystery slides, which helped hone those ID skills! Every campus walk we did, made it into an eBird checklist. Our BIS bird count of species is now up to **37 Species spotted!!** (see list below).



BIS feeders continue to attract a great variety of birds, with favorites like chickadees, titmice, bluejays, bluebirds, cardinals, goldfinches, wrens and more! The joy the birds bring to the students is immeasurable. Birding has opened up a whole new world to many and this will hopefully last a lifetime.

Our retention pond behind the school (and the air above it!) also delighted students, with the return of our aerial, swooping zig-zagging Tree Swallows back from migration, and our aquatic visitors the Great Blue Heron, a bonded Hooded Merganser pair, a Great Egret, and a bonded Mallard pair. Students also learned first-hand the importance of following birding protocols in spring. With nesting season in full swing, we watched the Mallard nest from an appropriate distance, saw their paternal care, AND got scolded by a not-so-happy papa Mallard! Our visit did not last long! Student birders now know why we keep a safe distance!



It was an amazing year of birding with these incredible middle school students! They loved our campus birding excursions, art projects, watching the live feeder cams on rainy or snowy days, learning about birds, sharing bird sightings from homes, neighborhoods, school, and community, and bonding with all things birds!

We are excited to welcome new birders into the BIS “flock” for the 26-27 school year!

This year, we are planning to do meet-ups at local sanctuaries on the weekends, as well as doing [Birdability](#) walks to assess birding locations for accessibility. (See next page)

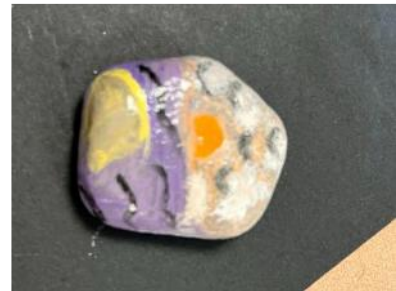
