CCBC PROGRAMS - March and April

March 13, 2006 - Sue Finnegan "Five Years of Bird Banding on Cape Cod"

Sue Finnegan has long had an interest in banding birds and studied with Peter Pyle in Point Reyes, CA and at the Powdermill Nature Reserve in PA. Sue banded birds for six years before obtaining her own Master Permit.

In 2000 she opened the Wing Island Bird Banding Station at the Cape Cod Museum of Natural History in Brewster, MA. In 2001, she was nationally certified by The North American Banding Council.

Currently a Vice President of the Eastern Blue Banding Association, Sue is also a member of the Association of Field Ornithologists.

In the summer of 2004, Sue was trained in hummingbird banding to become part of the Hummingbird Banding Network.

April 10, 2006 - Joey Mason "Keeping Company with Kestrels"

Come hear Joey Mason as she increases our knowledge about Kestrels! We'll learn that she has monitored and banded American Kestrels in Southeastern Mass on cranberry grower properties for 17 years.

Joey will tell her experiences about monitoring the boxes, other inhabitants of these boxes, and what she's learned through the years about the small "sparrow" hawk. Joey will be bringing both a male and a female American Kestrel for us to see up close.

Joey Mason has been involved in several different projects including banding hawks during the fall migration for the Cape May Raptor Banding Project, a member of the survey and monitoring team for two summers on the Colorado Division of Wildlife's

Club Field Activity Statistics

NOTE: This article covers Club field activities from November 2005 (one late entry) through January 2006. As usual, due to space limitations only selected birds are noted for each event; common species are omitted. Full statistical summaries for reported activities are available for inspection at each Club meeting. Unusual species are underlined, rarities double-underlined.

November 2005: One field activity was not available at the last newsletter deadline, and so was not included in the previous summary.

II/I5: Wellfleet, Truro, Province-town; Leader Ginie Page; weather cloudy; 7 observers; 43 spp. Red-throated and Common loons, Pied-billed Grebe, Northern Gannet, Double-crested Cormorant, Scaup sp., Surf, White-winged and Black scoters, Long-tailed Duck, Common Merganser, Ruddy Duck, Sharp-shinned Hawk, Pomarine Jaeger, Common and Forster's terns, Belted Kingfisher, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Tree Swallow, Townsend's Solitaire, Yellow-rumped Warbler.

December 2005: Only one field trip was reported in December.

12/11: Eastham, Welffleet: Leader Ellie Winslow; Sunny; 4 observers; 46 spp. Red-throated and Common loons, Pied-billed and Horned grebes, Northern Gannet, Great Blue Heron, Snow Goose, Surf Scoter, Long-tailed Duck, Common Goldeneye, Ruddy Duck, Cooper's and Red-tailed hawks, Greater Yellowlegs, Sanderling, Franklin's and Bonaparte's gulls, Razorbill, Belted Kingfisher, Downy Woodpecker, Carolina Wren, Song and Swamp sparrows.

January 2006: There were three field trips reported in January, two on the Cape and one joint activity off-Cape with the Brookline Bird Club. There were a total of 36 observers, for an average of 12 observers per event. A total of 92 species were reported. The greatest number of species observed at one event was 74, on the joint CCBC-BBC trip on January 7, 2006.

I/7 (Joint event with Brookline Bird Club): Westport MA area; Leader Bob Stymeist (BBC); weather not reported; I l observers; 74 spp. Red-throated and Common loons, Horned Grebe, Great Cormorant, Turkey Vulture, Northern Pintail, Canvasback, Redhead, Greater Scaup, Harlequin Duck, Common Goldeneye, Hooded, Common and Redbreasted mergansers, Bald Eagle, Northern Harrier, Cooper's Hawk, Merlin, Wild Turkey, Purple Sandpiper, Redbellied Woodpecker, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Eastern Phoebe, Carolina, Winter and Marsh wrens, Golden-

Sue received her Trainer Certification with the North American Banding Council at Braddock Bay Observatory in October of 2005 and hopes to begin a training program for banders at the Cape Cod Museum of Natural History in the near future.

Come to hear more about the purpose of banding, how birds are caught and what happens once the bird is caught, U.S. Government regulations, when and where birds are banded, and what to do if you find a banded bird.

crowned Kinglet, Eastern Bluebird, Hermit Thrush, Cedar Waxwing, Eastern Towhee, American Tree, Fox, Song, Swamp and White-throated sparrows (plus an unidentified *spizella* sparrow, possibly Clay-colored not included in total), Dark-eyed Junco, Red-winged Blackbird, Brown-headed Cowbird.

2005-06: Since August 2005, results show a total of 16 reported field activities, with 203 participants, an average of about 13 observers per event, which is above the average of just less than 10 recorded since keeping statistics. 168 spp. have been reported so far.

Remarks: Since we began compiling field activity statistics in late August 2003, there have been 158 events, with 1,491 participants, for an average of 9.68. In that time 265 spp. have been reported observed or heard.

Try 'On Your Own Birding' in March and April

Hawk Watch: Stop by Pilgrim Heights in North Truro and, with Don Manchester, check out the flight of returning raptors any decent day March until early summer. Wear quiet clothes - not bright colors. You'll be amazed and fascinated by the variety of hawks seen!

Woodcocks: One of the earliest migrants to arrive in Massachusetts, woodcocks may come as early late February. Spending the day in the woods where his coloring blends with the leaf litter, on spring evenings, the woodcock comes out into the open to do his spectacular sky dance. Look for him in clearings: meadows, bogs, power line cuts. He needs the open sky to perform. Plan to arrive on his dancing grounds just after sunset and wait for the signal that he is there. "Peent" he calls, hidden from view. "Peent." You hear the sound again, close and then far, as he circles - broadcasting his call in every direction. Then silently, he takes off, sloping up gradually and, as he gains height, begins his twittering sound. It becomes more frantic as he circles overhead. Toward the end, the twittering is joined by loud vocal chirping and the woodcock begins his descent. Abruptly it stops and he coasts silently back to his peenting location. Check out Long Pasture, Bone Hill Rd in Cummaquid or find your own new spot. Good luck!

Birding the Cape - Season by Season

MARCH - APRIL:

Late winter - early spring is a period of hope for birders. Each warm spell brings increasing expectations and anticipation swells as the most exciting (and shortest!) season of the year approaches. The first southerly winds in early March carry returning flocks of blackbirds and Woodcock begin their strange "peenting" in fields and damp clearings.

Gannets and waterfowl begin winging northward and a trip to Corporation Beach will often produce a few of the handsome Red-necked Grebe. By the end of March, the first egrets, Killdeer, Tree Swallows and phoebes have usually arrived.

Migration is in full swing during April and by mid-month trips to the Beech Forest in Provincetown, the Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary, the Dennis Pond area in Yarmouth, or the Ryder Conservation Area in Sandwich will often produce kinglets, creepers, sparrows, and gnatcatchers among others. Migrant hawks become conspicuous on the outer Cape, especially at Pilgrim Heights in Truro. Southerly storms will often blow in early Indigo Buntings, Baltimore Orioles and Rosebreasted Grosbeaks and, occasionally, rarer southern species such as Blue Grosbeak, Summer Tanager and Prothonotary Warbler.

By the end of the month, the first warblers trickle in, vanguards of the hoped-for May waves.

Birding in New Brunswick, Canada

News of our Sister Club

The Altacal Audubon Society conducted the 50th Annual Chico, CA Christmas Bird Count on December 18, 2005. A good strong rain storm kept some folks away (and some birds hiding out) but an enthusiastic group of observers scoured the landscape in a 15 mile diameter circle around Chico.

Our count covered a variety of habitats including foothill chaparral, oak woodland (blue oak, gray pine, live oak, bay laurel), a small apron of grassland savanna at the base of the foothills of the Sierra Nevada, Sacramento River riparian woodlands (valley oaks and sycamores), residential neighborhoods, orchards almonds and walnuts), and basin lands — formerly tule marsh, but now rice farms.

At the end of the day, one of the CBC-participating couples graciously offered their home for the compilation and fed us a wonderful meal complete with a "Happy 50th Anniversary" cake. The group tallied 100 species for the day. Our "off the list" birds included nine Tree Swallows (flying above the waters of the Sacramento River), two Peregrine Falcons (perhaps the same pair that attempted to breed in Upper Bidwell Park last spring), and an Osprey (seen in Upper Bidwell Park). Waterfowl numbers were generally low but we had our second highest counts of Hooded Mergansers (20), Sandhill Cranes (1,126) and Brewer's Blackbirds (5,838).

Peregrine Falcon Recovery Program, and Coordinator of the Raptor Retrofit Project (RRP) that she initiated for cranberry growers. The RRP is geared to protect Ospreys and other raptors from being electrocuted by electrical structures located on grower owned properties.

Joey worked for 13 years at the UMASS Cranberry Station in Wareham on greenhouse and cranberry-related research. These ties to the cranberry business have made properties available to her to erect nest boxes for Eastern Bluebirds, Tree Swallows and American Kestrels. She also works with local school education programs.

SATURDAY, MAY 20, 2006 UPPER CAPE

Bourne

Bourne Four Ponds Conservation Area — 7:00am - 9:00am Leader: Matt Malin, 508-274-8472.

We'll walk the trails around four ponds, Mill Pond, Shop Pond, Freeman Pond, and Upper Pond and The Basin to look for warblers and other spring migrants. Meet in the parking area on Barlow's Landing Road.

Falmouth

Crane Wildlife Management Area — 6:30pm - Dusk Leader: Mark Kaspryzk, 508-540-4706.

We'll explore the fields to look for several species of sparrows and other songbirds. Then we'll listen for displaying American Woodcocks and calling Whip-poor-wills. Meet in the parking area at the end of the dirt road just east of the Nickelodeon Theater off Rt. 151.

Sandwich

East Sandwich Game Farm — 6:45am - 9:00am Leader: Dick Jurkowski, 508-428-8494.

This 133-acre state owned area is managed by the Thornton Burgess Society. It's very productive for birds year-round. We'll check the Osprey nest for activity and fields for Eastern Bluebirds, Bobolinks, and Eastern Meadowlarks. We'll also look for migrating shorebirds in salt marshes and check ponds for ducks and Belted Kingfishers. Meet in the Christy's parking lot on Route 6A, across from Ploughed Neck Road, to carpool.

Mashpee

South Cape Beach — 12pm - 3:00pm Leaders: Mary Keleher, 508-477-1473, and Rob Maddux.

We'll walk this lovely barrier beach (2 miles round trip) enjoying views of Nantucket Sound to look for nesting Ospreys, Horned Larks, Piping Plovers, Willets, and Common and Least Terns. We should also see American Oystercatchers. Park in the Town Beach parking lot and meet at the gate for the beach trail.

MID-CAPE

Barnstable

Long Pasture Wildlife Sanctuary — 6:30pm - Dusk Leaders: David and Fran Clapp, 508-896-7322.

We'll look for spring migrants in fields and wooded areas. We'll also search for herons in ponds and then listen for displaying American Woodcocks at dusk. Meet in the upper parking area off Bone Hill Road.

Yarmouth

Dennis Pond — 7:00am - 9:00am Leader: Greg Hirth, 508-457-4356.

This area features a trail that leads through scenic woodlands including an old bog, pine forest, and small swamp making it a productive place to look for migrant warblers and other songbirds. Meet in the small parking area on Willow Street, north of Route 6, at Exit 7.

Crowes Pasture Conservation Area — 7:00am - 9:30am Leader: Diane Silverstein, 508-398-9484.

Cape Cod Bird Club monitors a 12-box Eastern Bluebird trail here and has seen many birds fledge since its inception two years ago. We'll walk about two miles through pine and oak woodland to the restored pasture in search of Eastern Bluebirds, warblers, hawks and many other species. Take School St. off Rte. 6A, turn right onto South St., pass cemetery, meet in parking lot on right 0.1 mile down dirt road from sign. Please do not park at cemetery.

Brewster

Punkhorn Conservation Area - 6:45am - 9:00am Leader: Mary Keleher, 508-477-1473.

This town conservation area encompasses nearly 800 acres of mixed pine-oak woodlands with overgrown bogs. We'll look for breeding birds including Black-billed and Yellow-billed Cuckoos, Eastern Wood-Pewees, Great Crested Flycatchers, Hermit Thrushes, and Scarlet Tanagers. Meet in small dirt parking lot at the end of Run Hill Road where pavement ends.

Harwich

Bourne Town Forest — 7:00am – 9:00am Leader: Matt Malin, 508-274-8472.

We'll explore this forested area to search for Black-billed and Yellow-billed Cuckoos, thrushes, warblers, tanagers and other migrant land birds. Meet on Valley Bars Road (unpaved) off County Rd.
